Lighting the Beacon

A crowd of about thirty villagers had gathered close to the beacon at Hall Farm in Dadlington to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee, with another group watching from the road. The beacon initially resisted the attempts to fire

it into life from Kate and Eddie, but eventually, wisps of smoke began to rise into the air. Then, there appeared a flickering flame or two, which finally burst into a mighty conflagration that lit up the faces of the watching locals. Every so often, a piece of burning debris would vacate the beacon and set fire to the nearby grass, occasioning a cry of, "Fire! Fire!" from several children, the self-appointed guardians of the turf, and this was the cue for Ben to douse the small conflagration with water from a leaking bucket. It was great entertainment.



In recent times, the lighting of beacons has been associated with commemorative events, but the practice has been a form of defence from time immemorial. In the bible, Jeremiah 6:1 talks of "a sign of fire," to warn of approaching evil, whilst Isaiah 30:13 mentions, "a beacon on top of a mountain." For the inhabitants of our islands, the constant threat of an invasion by sea led to various kings ordering beacons to be set up and maintained.

The earliest documented occasion was in 1324 when Edward II, fearing an invasion by his estranged Queen Isabella, ordered beacons to be established on the Isle of Wight. In 1468, Edward IV set out a royal command to create a network of beacons, and these were no doubt the ones that Richard III was relying on seventeen years later, to bring him news of Henry Tudor's invasion. The most famous use of warning beacons came in 1588, with the threat of the Spanish Armada. Several beacons still in use today, were part of that early warning chain that began when the Spanish fleet were spotted off the coast of Devon and Cornwall. It is impossible to calculate how long it took the fire signals to reach Elizabeth I and her council in London but, even given the time taken to establish a decent flame visible from the nearby beacons, it would be considerably faster than a rider on horseback, the common form of communication over distance back then. The system had its flaws however. In 1545, with a feared invasion by the French, a coastal beacon was lit by mistake. The resulting domino effect of warning fires reached as far as Worcestershire where a militia of labourers and

farmers set off to engage with the enemy, reaching Swindon before being informed it was all a false alarm.

In terms of historical reenactment, the lighting of the Dadlington beacon fell short on many counts. For a start, all the Jubilee beacons were lit simultaneously across the country, rather than in a chain, which was just as well because, as the light faded, no other beacon could be clearly identified across the rolling Leicestershire and Warwickshire countryside. But as a piece of theatre and as an act of community celebration, it was a roaring success.

They played us rhythms and we had to guess which dance would have accompanied the tune, such as Salsa, Cha Cha. Tango etc. then they played tunes which we had to name.

Harry then gave us a demonstration of the many types of drums which he had brought and the ways they can be played. He played with his hands and fingers not sticks

he had Bongos, Congo Drum, Peruvian collecting box, Samba Drum which makes animal noises by rubbing a wet cloth on a pole inside the drum, which had an open end. Box drum, (which we thought was a speaker,) when we saw it, but Harry sat on it an created a rhythm by beating a tune on it. It made a higher sound at the top of the box and a deeper sound lower down

Neville then used his guitar to demonstrate the various rhythms and tones of the Cuban style of music, he played 'el condor passa' which most of now know as a Simon and Garfunkle Classic, plus how to produce the classical south American sound.

Members enjoyed tortilla chips and dips while listening.

We welcomed lots of guests to our meeting and hope that they enjoyed the evening and will come again.
